Dear Visitor to Historia Ophthalmologica Internationalis,

After 33 years of editing, illustrating and completing the English translation of Julius Hirschberg's monumental "History of Ophthalmology", I decided to make this huge treatise available to people all over the world. This has been made possible for me through the internet journal: Historia Ophthalmologica Internationalis.

Both, today's "Journal" and the original "Treatise" would not have been published without the participation of two giants of the twenty century ophthalmology: Jules François of Ghent and Frederick C. Blodi (Iowa)

Initially, François asked me to publish a new "History of Ophthalmology" that was to be written by Patrick Trevor-Roper, but I rejected the idea knowing that nobody nowadays would have sufficient time to complete such a "History" as Hirschberg's. Reprinting Hirschberg in German was not an option, because that language is little understood by ophthalmologists outside of Europe.

This was the main reason why we originally decided to start a historical journal: *Historia Ophthalmologica Internationalis*. This is now a free internet journal.

With the editorship of François (Chief editor), Baillart, (Paris), Blodi (Iowa), Corcelle (Paris), Duque-Estrada (Rio de Janeiro), Grom (Caracas), Hollwich (Munich), Newell (Chicago), Streiff (Lausanne) and Patrick Trevor-Roper (London) success seemed certain.

Meanwhile, during an International Congress, I met Frederick Blodi in person and I mentioned my old idea of an English treatise on the "History of Ophthalmology" to replace the History in German, written by Julius Hirschberg.

His reaction was immediate: "Why not simply translate it?".

"And who would do that?" I asked.

With a large, warm smile, he offered to me to translate the complete work on a voluntary basis.

Twelve volumes to translate!

That was 1981...

Fred Blodi finished translating the original German edition in 1992, adding a volume of his own composition. (Ophthalmology & Postal Stamps 1985). Sadly Blodi died in 1996, shortly after he had completed the translation of all the original Hirschberg volumes.

Now, in 2015, that giant of a treatise with its associated Monographs is finished and will be presented, free of any charges, chapter by chapter and volume by volume to the visitors to the website: Historia.

I will start with Robert Fernand Heitz's truly magnificent "History of Contact Lenses" (translated by Colin Mailer, London Ontario). This is Hirschberg's "History of Ophthalmology", Volume 11 Part 3a, 3b and 3c, published respectively in 2003, 2005 & 2014.
